

# LE ROY PENNYSAVER & NEWS - NOVEMBER 6, 2016 LeRoy Junior Knights Football 2016 CYFL Championship Game

#### LeRoy Junior Knights 20 – Canisteo Redskins 0

The 2016 Community Youth Football League Championship was played at Avon Central School in a matchup between the undefeated 8 - 0 LeRoy Junior Knights against the 7 -1 Canisteo Redskins. For the first time this season, Mother Nature made her presence felt on what would be a cold, damp and at times, rainy day.

The Junior Knights would win the toss and chose to defer, preferring to start the game on defense and get the ball to start the second half. Canisteo's offense, averaging 24 points per game, would take the field starting from their 35 yard line. Three stops by the LeRoy defense powered by Holden "Sully" Sullivan, Luke Lathan, Jude Sherman, JoJo Vernacinni, Aaric Luce and Jake Egeling set up a 4th down and 3. Canisteo, showing faith in the offensive line, chose to go for it on fourth down early in the game. However, Holden Sullivan, Aaric Luce and Jake Egeling teamed up to bust through the line and stop the Canisteo running back for no gain.

LeRoy would take over possession of the football at Canisteo's 42 yard line. LeRoy's offensive line would seize control of the line of scrimmage early as Adam Woodworth and Luke Lathan teamed up behind them to drive the Knights down to 10 where they faced a 3rd down and 1. The Knights would draw the defense offsides and be rewarded with a 1st and goal at the 5. One play later, Woodworth would give LeRoy a 6-0 lead. The PAT attempt failed. LeRoy 6 - Canisteo 0.

Canisteo's next possession started with a fumbled exchange between the QB and running back pushing them into a 2nd and 14. On the next play, Canisteo's Gavin Bob got loose first around the left end then cut back all the way across the field, avoiding multiple LeRoy tacklers before finally being brought down at the 49 for a 19 yard gain. LeRoy's defense would again stiffen for three straight plays forcing a 4th & 2. For a second time in as many possessions, Canisteo chose to go for it. DJ O'Geen made it a bad de-



cision as he shed his blocker and stopped the Canisteo back a yard short of the first down maker.

LeRoy would take over at their 42. An 8 yard gain by Woodworth was negated after a holding penalty. This would end up being the final play of the first quarter. On the first play of the 2nd quarter, LeRoy would turn the ball over to the Redskins who would take possession at LeRoy's 45 vard line.

On the first play of their next drive, Canisteo's Gavin Bob broke loose down to LeRoy's 20 yard line. On the next play, Bob once again broke free around the left side and appeared to be headed for a game tying score when Jude Sherman raced across the field for a touchdown saving tackle forcing Bob out at the 1 yard line. With only a half yard to spare, LeRoy would stage a huge four play goal line stand behind defensive stalwarts Luke Lathan, DJ O'Geen, Jude Sherman and Holden Sullivan. Wyatt Draper and Jake Egeling would make the final stop behind the line on 4th and goal.

With their backs against the goal line, the Junior Knights chose to line up Woodworth under center for consecutive QB sneaks. Aaric Luce, DJ O'Geen and Holden Sullivan would provide enough push to allow Woodworth to move the ball to the 6 yard line setting up a crucial 3rd & 5. Woodworth, behind an ever determined offensive line and lead blockers powered forward for 8 yards and a first down. Now with some breathing room, the Knights were poised to strike. After a 5 yard run by Luke

Lathan, Jake Higgins and Jude Sherman executed text book blocks "on the edge" and Adam Woodworth out ran the entire defense for 81 yards and TD. The PAT failed. LeRoy 12 – Canisteo 0.

The half ended as Canisteo was forced to punt as time ran out.

LeRoy opened the second half with the football and a chance to lengthen their lead and take firm control of the game. Seven straight plays run into the heart of the defense aided by a face mask penalty set up LeRoy with a 1st and 10 at Canisteo's 20. The eighth play of drive proved too much for the Redskins' defense as Wyatt Draper, Luke Lathan and Jude Sherman delivered punishing blocks at the point of attack and Woodworth raced 20 yards for a touchdown. After a successful PAT run by Woodworth, LeRoy had extended the lead to LeRoy 20 - Canisteo 0.

Canisteo looked like they were going to answer and answer quickly as Gavin Bob again, on a nifty cut, got to the sideline and appeared to be on his way to a 65 yard touchdown. However, for the second time, Jude Sherman sprinted from across the field to catch him from behind at the 4. This set up LeRoy's second goal line stand of the day. Four attempts to score from the 4 yard line turned up empty as LeRoy's defense, behind Cole Tonzi, Wyatt Draper, Cam Wilson, Aaric Luce, Jude Sherman and Jack Egeling stopped them short, again with only a half yard to spare.

The remainder of the second half saw LeRoy's offense play

"keep away" as they held onto the ball for a total of 29 plays. In doing so, they never gave Canisteo a chance to stage a comeback as Canisteo was given the opportunity to run just 9 second half plays. In a show of determination and heart, as many as 19 different Junior Knights took turns on the offensive line while paving the way for first down after first down.

As the game clock wound down to zero, the Knights were able to assume the best offensive formation in football, the "Victory Position" as quarterback Alex Spezzano took the final snap and "took a knee". LeRoy 20 – Canisteo 0.

The Junior Knights offensive line and lead blockers led the way for Adam "Bucha" Woodworth as he gained 226 hard fought yards on 31 carries. Luke Lathan carried the ball 7 times for 27 yards and Jude Sherman 6 times for 19 yards.

The Junior Knights defense was led by Jude Sherman who recorded 10 tackles followed by Jack Egeling with 8. With 6 tackles each was Holden Sullivan and Aaric Luce. Adam Woodworth had 5 tackles, Luke Lathan 4. DJ O'Geen and Wyatt Draper each had 2 tackles. Jay Lathan, Alex Spezzano, JoJo Vernacinni, Noah Kaczanowski, Connor Elmore, Joey Reschke, Cole Tonzi, Cameron Wilson all chipped in with 1 apiece.

The victory marked the second straight CYFL Championship and 18th consecutive win by the LeRoy Junior Knights.

# Information About <u>Your</u> LeRoy Ambulance Service October 20, 2016

- We are no longer a volunteer organization and rely almost entirely on paid paramedic/ EMT staff to provide 24/7 emergency care
- Volunteers are still welcome however few meet the demanding EMT and Paramedic training/experience requirements
- Our ambulance crews answered 1091 calls for service in 2015
- Our ambulance crews were generally able to get to the patient in five to ten minutes
- Our annual budget is over \$500,000
- Nearly all our funding comes from private insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, and patients
- Private and government insurance programs severely discount (by 52%) the payments for emergency ambulance services
- Our average annual deficit is \$52,000 for each of the past five years
- Unpaid patient bills add significantly to this deficit
- We cannot refuse care even if a patient neglects to pay their bill
- In 2015 the Town and Village of LeRoy provided \$30,000 in supplementary aid to LAS


# **Votes for Women**

This Saturday, November 4, there are two events that might be of interest. First, there is an antique show at the American Legion. The proceeds from the tickets at the door will help the Historical Society. The project we have designated is the repair of the steampipe in the basement of LeRoy House. The repairs have already been done and the bucket on the floor has been moved just in time for our school programs. So stop by the American Legion and see if there is some little treasure that might find a new home, or might be a Christmas gift for someone.

The other event is at Genesee Community College. It is a Heritage Fair and features exhibits by several of the museums and organizations in the area. The theme for the event is Presidential Elections and the LeRoy Historical Society is focusing on the events that led up to the 1920 election, which was the first presidential election in New York in which women could vote. The road to women's suffrage was long. In Julv 1848, the first women's rights convention was held in Seneca Falls. During the next twenty vears, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and many others attempted to keep the issue of women's rights on the national agenda as well as the state level. In 1867, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucy Stone addressed the New York Constitutional Convention, with a proposal to allow suffrage to women. In the meantime, Susan B. Anthony was in Kansas, trying to get support for women's suffrage. It was defeated. But there was success in the Territory of Wyoming where in 1869, women were not only given the right to vote, but also to hold public office. (Other states allowed women to vote in local school elections, but none in federal elections.) In 1870, Utah Territory granted full suffrage to women. On November 5, 1872, Susan B. Anthony and fourteen other women voted in the national election in the Eighth Ward of Rochester. Anthony was arrested and judged guilty. She never paid the fine.

Colorado joined Wyoming and Utah, granting women universal suffrage. In some states, it was necessary to amend their state constitution. Idaho adopted a constitutional amendment in 1896 and Washington voted for women's suffrage in 1910 followed by California in 1911. In 1912, Wisconsin and Michigan defeated proposed suffrage amendments. but Kansas, Oregon and Arizona approved constitutional amendments. Illinois became the first state east of the Mississippi to vote for women's suffrage in 1913. Then in 1914, Mississippi, Nevada and Montana accepted women's suffrage. But suffrage was rejected in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, and Pennsylvania in 1915.

for The proponents suffrage in New women's York State, presented а suffrage measure to the State Legislature every year (with the exception of the Civil War) from 1854 until 1917. In 1880. the Legislature undertook to give women the right to vote at school meetings, but the law could not be enforced. At that time, all efforts were attempts to change the state constitution which required a voters referendum (which meant that only men would vote on women's rights). In 1901, Governor Theodore Roosevelt, a proponent for women's suffrage, advised the suffragists to abandon their constitutional strategy, and to look for other ways to secure partial suffrage. But after five years, State leaders decided to return to the original effort for the submission to the male voters of a constitutional amendment.. In 1908, Senator Percy Hooker of LeRoy (who lived in the house, we now known as the Creekside Inn) introduced the resolution.



In 1915, the men of New York voted against women's suffrage. The state vote was 553,348 for suffrage and 748,332 against. Finally in 1917, the referendum was passed. (It should be noted that in LeRoy, the men defeated the proposal by 38 votes.)

Women in LeRoy voted in their first election in March 1918. Ninety-one year old Miss Delia Phillips of Myrtle Street, cast the first vote at the Municipal Building. She was first in line and was not only the first women to vote, but also the first person to cast a ballot. The second ballot was cast by Mrs. A.C. Upham. It was noted that the last two votes of the day were cast by women - Mrs. B.W. Logan and Miss Sarah Bissell. The newspaper article read: "Practically all the interest attached to the election was the voting of women. They seemed to enjoy it thoroughly, many of them coming down from the Red Cross rooms in their caps and aprons to vote. (Because of World War I, the LeRoy Red Cross was actively

involved with projects at the Municipal Building.) They apparently had little trouble in working the machine, and the percentage of votes lost is no larger than before women voted." There were 134 votes cast and 58 of those votes were cast by women. It was noted that the Republican slate of officers for the Village was unopposed.

The 19th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, which would give all women the right to vote was submitted to Congress on June 4, 1919. New York's Senators split their vote. Senator William Calder voted in favor. Senator Wadsworth (from Geneseo, who had always opposed women's suffrage) voted no. Of New York's Representatives in Congress, 35 voted in favor; five were absent; three voted against - including Archie Sanders of Stafford. The 19th Amendment was finally ratified in 1920 which gave women throughout the United States the right to vote.

# LeRoy 20 Livonia 0 LeRoy Seniors Capture CYFL Championship

The LeRoy Senior Football squad won the CYFL championship in cold and rainy conditions on Sunday October 30th, dominating Livonia by a score of 20-0. The Senior Knights employed a suffocating defense throughout the game and an explosive offense in the first half to claim the trophy at Avon's high school stadium.

Livonia won the toss and elected to defer, giving the ball to the Knights. Bryce Lathan recovered an onside kick attempt, giving LeRoy good field position. The offense looked to score quickly after a 27 yard run by Jackson Fix, however a fumble 1 play later would give the ball to Livonia inside their own 20. The LeRoy defense would stand tall, and only 2 plays later, Drew Strollo recovered a Livonia fumble to give the ball back to the Knights in the driving rain.

This time, the Knights would capitalize. Behind 3 hard runs by Jackson Fix, LeRoy would find themselves on the Livonia 1 yard line. Fix would barrel in for the TD, and then the 2-point conversion to give LeRoy the early 8-0 lead.

LeRoy's defense would continue to play overwhelming defense on the next possession. An excellent kickoff by Zachary Tooley would bury the Livonia offense inside their own 35. A tackle on 4th down by Tony Piazza would give the ball back to LeRoy quickly. However the sloppy conditions would strike again, as LeRoy turned the ball over yet again with a fumble.

Livonia took over on offense and moved the chains for the first time in the quarter. Not to be undone, the Knights defense swarmed to the ball in droves, again forcing a fumble. Drew Strollo recovered the fumble again, giving LeRoy the ball inside Livonia territory. After a couple short runs, Riley Williams broke free for a 25 vard gain to begin the second quarter. Two plays later, Drew Strollo found a seam in between excellent blocks from Ryan Higgins and Jackson Fix

and darted 22 yards for a TD, diving to the pylon. A failed conversion attempt would leave the score 14-0 LeRoy early in the second quarter.

The LeRoy defense continued to dominate, this time behind stud defensive lineman Hunter Beverly. On 4th and long, Livonia attempted their first pass of the game, but the "X-Man", Xavien Walker intercepted the ball to thwart the drive. LeRoy's offense would pick up a quick first down, however Livonia's defense would force a turnover on downs shortly thereafter.

Livonia began their drive on their own 24. After a false start, the Knights defense smelled blood in the water. Only 2 plays later, Drew Strollo would recover another fumble, his third of the half, giving LeRoy the ball back with a few minutes left in the half. Several hard runs gained a first down, but a holding call moved back the Knights. Despite the windy and rainy conditions, it was quarterback Tommy "T-Smooth" Condidorio's time to flaunt his arm. An 8 vard completion to Jackson Fix got the ball moving in the right direction. On the next play, under extreme pressure, the QB placed a pass in the palms of streaking tight end Ryan Higgins, who broke free to score a TD from 14 yards out. After a failed conversion attempt, LeRoy held the lead 20-0. Both defenses held strong for a possession heading into halftime.

Another great kickoff by Zachary Tooley gave the ball to Livonia at their own 32. Livonia, desperate to get something going on offense went to a no huddle offense. The plan worked, as the Junior Bulldogs were able to move the chains more than once for the first time in the game. However LeRoy's defense continued to swarm to the ball, especially as Livonia threatened to score. At times it appeared as if LeRoy had 20 defenders on the field at once. After a couple of big hits by Jackson Fix, Livonia faced a 4thdown. The Knights defense stood tall as Drew Strollo made the initial hit at the line of scrimmage and was aided by a plethora of teammates to halt the Livonia drive after 14 plays at the 10 yard line.

Deep in their own territory, LeRoy got some breathing room after a couple short runs and a couple of personal foul calls on Livonia. Chewing up clock, the Knights turned the ball over on downs. Livonia continued to try to find the end zone, however a sack by Ryan Higgins to end the 3rd quarter made that goal difficult as the Knights again forced a quick turnover on downs to start the 4th quarter.

Livonia's aggressive defense forced a quick punt by the Knights. Livonia took the ball over inside the LeRoy 30, however could not muster up any offense. This time, Tony Piazza wrestled away a fumble recovery from a Livonia defender like he was fighting for the last meatball on earth, giving the Knights back the football after their 5th forced turnover. Again, chewing up clock, the Knights offense took over deep in their own territory. Good sized gains by Riley Williams and Drew Strollo moved the ball out close to midfield before a holding call thwarted their progress. Defensive ends Connor Hegeman (3 tackles) and Ryan Higgins (3 tackles, 1 sack) held the edge forcing plays inside all

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day. Defensive linemen Hunter Beverly (4), Connor McGee (4), and Bryce Lathan (4) all made multiple tackles, fighting off big Livonia linemen. Other Knights contributing on tackles included Jack Lathan, Antonio Martinez, Kyle Northrup, and Landen Saeva.

A balanced attack provided the scoring punch for the offense. Tommy Condidorio braved the elements and hit all 3 of his passes for 30 yards and a TD. Ryan Higgins caught 2 balls for 22 yards and a TD. Jackson Fix had a catch for 8 yards, and ran hard for 52 yards including a TD and a conversion. Drew Strollo endured big hits to run for 76 yards and a TD, while Riley Williams added an important 42 yards on the ground. Landen Saeva and Tony Piazza also carried the ball, with Piazza clearing space with tough blocking.

# Superintendent's Column

November has arrived! I truly think this is the quickest month of the year!

This is the time of year that I like to remind families about the processes used in making determinations about school closings. Schools are dismissed early or closed due to inclement weather, or other emergencies, only when absolutely necessary for the safety and welfare of students and staff.

The LeRoy Central School District resides in a snowbelt and most storms can be managed effectively. For this reason, please assume school will be open and encourage students to be prepared for their next day's studies. Anticipate the possibility that busses may be a bit delayed snowy during rainy or conditions and dress children appropriately for weather conditions.

We understand that a decision to open or close school in bad weather will have an impact on our families. We consider many factors while making these decisions, including:

• Current and projected weather conditions.

• Road patrols by the Village, Town and District. Reports include the condition of local roads, sidewalks and parking lots, taking into account snow and ice, as well as other hazards such as downed trees or power lines. These reports also provide an assessment of the progress of snow clearing.

• Director of Transportation report after gathering information about road conditions in local and surrounding areas.

• Temperature and wind chill factors. The County Health Department recommends that we consider closing schools if the wind chill is expected to fall to -25 or below degrees.

When it is necessary to close or dismiss schools for any emergency, including inclement weather, every effort is made to make announcements by robo calls and text messages, on local radio, and television broadcasts by 6:30 a.m. The District will also post notices on the District website.

When the decision has been made to close schools or dismiss early, all evening school activities will be cancelled, including athletic practices and contests, club meetings, and any other student after-school activities.

It is the responsibility of parents or guardians to make the final decision regarding school attendance. If parents feel the weather is too severe, they have the right to keep their child(ren) home. In this instance, it is essential that the parent contact the school to alert them of their child(ren)'s absence and to make arrangements for missed work.

Please speak with your school principal if you have any questions about these procedures. Let's hope that we won't have to use them this winter!
